

Lettermen Club debuts "Activities Nights" with Dodgeball tournament

On Friday, Feb. 5, Lane's Lettermen Club held its first of many "Activities Nights." The first was a dodgeball tournament since last year's dodgeball tournament proved to be so successful. Admission was five dollars for participants and spectators.

Around 5:45 pm, teams began checking in. After a slow start-having only four confirmed teams a week before the event-the tournament ended up consisting of 20 teams.

Some teams got into the spirit of the tournament, showing up with unique uniforms and names. Many made shirts that proudly displayed their team names, and wore matching shorts and socks.

One team even went as far as wearing a uniform that represented their name; "The Anchormen" showed up in suits and fake mustaches which they wore for their games.

"[My team and I] are just a bunch of crazy dudes, and we figured you have to be pretty crazy to play a dodgeball tourney in blazers and ties," said Jake Poliszczuk, Div.

042, a member of The Anchormen. "We thought it would be hilarious." Another Will Ferrell comedy, Stepbrothers, was the source for the team name Pres-

tige Worldwide. The Typical Cats took their name from the local Chicago hip-hop group of the same name.

"Three days before the tournament my friend asked me if I had any ideas [for a team name], and well, in my mind I already knew that Typical Cats would be perfect for us," said Emanuel Guzman, Div. 182, member of The Typical Cats.

Participants were optimistic going into the tournament.

"I knew that other teams had a lot of talent and would be hard to beat, but none had outfits like The Anchormen," Poliszczuk said. "Underneath the suits, we wanted to win it. [We wanted to] have fun-yesbut we all had the winner's mindset."

"We were pretty optimistic about the whole tournament," said Matt Ortiz, Div. 028, a member of Prestige Worldwide. "We were telling everybody we were going to make it all the way to the end, so we had to walk the walk since we talked a lot during school."

"We knew we were going to be the favorites. Nobody else matched up against us," said Kyle Huber, Div. 028, another member of Prestige Worldwide. "We didn't have any doubt that we [were] going to win."

"In regard to the other teams, I was excited. [I] thought there was some good competition and expected the tournament to be a lot of fun and at the same time competitive," said Nicholas Virgilio, Div. 184, member of the Malibu Riders. "I expected my team to make it all the way to the championship game. We had high expectations of ourselves."

Others, however, did not have high expectations.

"We didn't expect to make it far at all," Guzman said. "We at least wanted to win one game. That was our goal."

"I'll admit we didn't expect to make it very far, but it all depended on who we thought we would play," said Jensen Rohlfs, Div. 030, member of The Breakfast Club. "We knew we were better than most teams, but we also knew that there were teams that were better than us too.'

"We really wanted to win, but we knew that wasn't going to happen so we made it our goal to at least get past the first round with a win," said Alexandria Melton, Div. 163, member of Lady Indians and Sergio. The tournament began shortly after 6pm. For the sake of time, the gym was divided into three courts.

Spectators quickly got into the games, cheering loudly for the teams they were there to support.

Dodgeballs were flying in every direction, into other courts and even the stands.

After the first round, nine teams remained: Prestige Worldwide, The Breakfast Club, A.N.T. Squad, The Typical Cats, Brick Squad, In Your Face, The Wrestlers, The Anchormen, and Taboo.

Since the tournament was single-elimination, as teams were eliminated, they quickly took sides with other teams and booed anyone playing against them. Consequently, along with the loud cheering, there was also a lot of booing going on throughout the tournament.

With fewer participating teams as eliminations occurred, each round went by more quickly. After the second round, five teams remained-Brick Squad, In Your Face, Prestige Worldwide, The Anchormen, and The Typical Cats.

With the tournament down to five teams, Mr. LoGalbo, tournament organizer, decided to give a team a bye, skipping round three and automatically advancing to the fourth round. Through a random selection, Brick Squad received the bye. After round three, only three teams remained so another bye was given, this time to Prestige Worldwide.

With the Typical Cats facing off against Brick Squad for the right to go to the final, the crowd became rowdier, having only one court to focus on. Everyone quickly chose a team to cheer for.

When The Typical Cats beat Brick Squad, the final match was set. Spectators surrounded the court for the championship game.

The Typical Cats' advancing in the

championship game came as a surprise to many.

"[I thought we'd be up against] either The Anchormen or [Brick Squad]," Huber said.

"I was expecting it to be us against the Malibu Riders because they had a pretty stacked team," Ortiz said.

"[I expected] my team [to make it to the finals] because Reed Lubin, my teammate has a wicked curve ball," said Jake Pieruccini, Div. 040, member of No Fake Talk.

"I expected the baseball team and my team [to make it to the championship game], not the soccer team," Virgilio said.

"Looking at the games while we were resting, I expected Malibu Riders to make it all the way," Guzman said. "Before the game, I saw them, and they were intimidating."

Richard Green, Div. 150, a member of Prestige Worldwide, however, was not surprised.

"I expected to face [The Typical Cats] in the finals," Green said. "I knew that we would end up facing them after I started seeing them beat teams [whom] I thought were going to make it far."

Both teams played really well in the final, leading to a three game final.

Prestige Worldwide won the first game, after it turned into a one-on-one dodgeball game between Huber and Guzman, and The Typical Cats won the second game. Finally, during "overload," which is a point in the game in which the teams are allowed to

cross the boundary line into the other team's court, Prestige Worldwide eliminated the last of The Typical Cats. Participants look forward to the next "Activities Night" and even provided suggestions.

"Of course [I would participate]! I think it's great for the school, and I know evervone had so much fun—win or lose," Poliszczuk said.

"I would definitely participate," Melton said.

"I would [participate], although the team we played cheated so that lead to our early exit, but yeah, they should have another one," Pieruccini said. "Maybe a bags tournament."

Not all participants were as satisfied with the event.

"There were too many problems with the dodgeball tournament," Virgilio said. "Horrible reffing, bad enforcement of the tournament rules, and an excessive amount of cheating are my main complaints. I understand that it was supposed to be a fun activity for all the students, but when my money is involved, I expect things to be taken seriously."

The Lettermen Club fundraised about \$1,000, but it did not meet the expectations of Coach Rio or LoGalbo.

"It was really disappointing," Rio said. "I thought we'd get a big turnout."

The Lettermen hope to hold their next "Activities Night" on Feb. 26, but the actual tournament has yet to be determined.

New law will admit students based on income, change Lane's diversity

ras vacated the CPS desegregation decree. CPS had required a race-based highest scores in the poorest groups will get top priority. admission to selective enrollment high Schools since 1980. The goal was to have populations at Selective Enrollment Schools that were 15-35 percent white and 65-85 percent minorities. As a result of the change, race will no longer play a part in the 2010-2011 admissions process The new law for admission to selective enrollment high schools is now based more on where a student lives, though financial statistics of those areas will also factor in. Chicago has been split into four groups based on median family income, adult educational attainment, percent of single parent households, percent of owner occupied homes, and percent of population speaking a language other than English. Lane's population is already made up of students from all corners of the city. The new law aims to reduce the likelihood that the best schools will not be accessible only to children from the wealthiest and best-educated families.

40 percent of students will be accepted based purely on their overall score out of 900, which is a composite of grades, ISAT scores, and the selective enrollment test. After those 40 percent are in, the next 60 percent are On Sept. 24, 2009, United States District Court Judge Charles P. Koco- accepted based on their scores within their group. The students with the The change was made based upon facts that students who live in poverty and attend economically isolated schools generally experience lower educational outcomes. On the other hand, students who attend schools with a socially and economically diverse student population tend to experience higher educational outcomes.

"When we came back to school this year we had an assembly, where our counselor explained the new law to us," said Anna Miller, a seventh grader who attends LaSalle Language Academy.

Not all schools have been doing as much as La Salle to keep their students up to date with the ever changing laws of CPS.

Prospective students will be sorted into one of the four groups. The first

Not everyone is pleased with the change in policy.


"I don't think race should matter," said Eric Butler, Div. 170. "There shouldn't be a certain number of minorities that have to attend Selective Enrollment schools. It's all about focusing [on school] and doing your best in the classroom. If those things are done, then it would be extremely hard for anyone, including minorities, not to be accepted to the school of their choice."

Most elementary schools are trying to make sure their students and parents are aware of the change.

"The students were not made aware of the policy change. The principal did present the information at a Local School Council meeting," said Linda Acevedo, the vice Principal at Newberry Academy.

As a school that is so proud of its diverse population Lane is at risk of losing some of its diversity due to the law change. According to Lane Admissions Officer, Molly Hart, there will be no way to see a change in Lane's student demographics until all incoming freshman have been accepted.

"I hope that [the school's diversity] doesn't change," she said, "because it's such a nice [aspect] of the school. We are a kind of a cross section of the city and everyone pretty much gets along, and the kids are talented across the board in all kinds of different areas and I just hope that continues."

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Lane Special Ed. aide, Walterine Briscoe, passes away

Mrs.Walterine Briscoe, a prominent member of the Special Education Department and staff of Lane, passed away on Wed, Jan. 6, after a long fight with cancer. She was 58 years old.

The passing of Briscoe saddened those on the administration and staff who knew her.

"Her death was kind of expected," Dr. LoBosco said. "She had been sick for a long time, but the timing was just tough. A new year had started. We just thought we would have a break after all that had happened."

"She was a hardworking woman, and I'll truly miss her," Diane Carroll said.

Many who worked with her were on a first name basis with her because she insisted on it.

'She never used last names because she was comfortable with everybody," nurse, Margaret Woods, said.

"She called everybody by their first name," Patrick Johnson, another aide, said.

Briscoe was known to be a very hard working woman, who dedicated her time to her family and her job because she cared about making a difference and having an impact on the lives of others.

Briscoe worked for the Board of Education as a Teacher Aide for disabled students for over 20 years. She worked at Lane as an aide helping the severely and profoundly disabled students.

She was known as a 'feisty' woman and even worked as a Union Steward for Local 46 Teachers

Before working at Lane, Briscoe earned various degrees in fields that included Child Welfare, Business, and Cultural Science.

"The education and welfare of children meant a lot to her. These kids meant a lot to her, and she was the type of person who could honestly say 'I love my job," Woods said.

"She was a hard worker and she took her job very seriously," Carroll said.

"She loved the kids and was a great teacher to them and to me," aide, Jason Warren said.

Briscoe was more than a great coworker to most of those she worked with; she had a great impact on their personal lives as well.

"She was like my mother away from home," Warren said. "She helped me with everything."

"She was like a second mother to me," Johnson said. "She gave me so much knowledge. If you wanted to learn from somebody, she was the

"[She] and I were very close friends. We walked around Jewel's parking lot everyday," Woods said. "Ms. B loved her some Jewels."

"Ms. B taught me everything I needed to know about my job," Warren said. "If I needed help or didn't understand I went to her, and she would teach me and help me."

"There was a time when a coworker was sick. Ms. B went into the office and asked if he could have a month of her sick days so he wouldn't be penalized for not working. That's a friend," Woods said.

Briscoe will always be remembered for being a strong woman who cared about what she did.

"Some people can be humanitarians and not be famous. What Ms.B did was not in vain, and she was a humanitarian," Woods said.

Since June 20, 2009, Yasnai Rodriguez, Div. 031, has worn just one color (or lack thereof)-white. Her

As a member of a Yoruban religion called Santeria, Rodriguez is currently partaking in a year-long commitment that entails wearing all-white clothing, a white hat, and skirts on a daily basis.

"It is like a promise that I make for the religion. It is one of the things that we have to do when we are initiated," Rodriguez said, "It shows my faith.'

June 20 will mark the formal admission of Rodriguez into her religion, complete with a celebration. She will then be able to practice the religion independently and pass it on to oth-

ers.

Consistent with most religious color symbolism this initiation values white as the color of virginity, purity, innocence, and cleanliness. It also helps to preserve family traditions.

"It is a religion my family has been a

family go through the same thing, so it was just a matter of when it would be my turn," she said.

Originating in West Africa over 6,000 years ago, notably Nigeria and Benin, the Yoruba religion spread as slavery took many ethnic Yorubans to the New World. Different regions developed their own versions of Yoruban religion. It flourished in Brazil and Caribbean islands, including Cuba, where the Rodriguez family first adopted it.

"We believe in God, we just have different names for him," Rodriguez said. "We have similar beliefs to Catholicism."

Major doctrines of Santeria are contact with the divine saints (called orishas), destiny, reincarnation, and appreciation of nature. Rodriguez is very open to talking about this and the pledges she has made, in most cases.

"My religion isn't as uncommon as many think. When I am asked about it I am happy to answer questions, I just don't like when people already

Fortunately, Rodriguez's friends have been very supportive of her initiation, but others remain less friendly.

There are some people who stopped talking to me completely [this year]," she said.

Despite this, Rodriguez remains devoted to her promise. It hasn't been much of a challenge for her, yet it carries heavy meaning.

Alpha Program proves tougher than expected

Getting into a selective enrollment school, like Lane, is a triumph in itself but for a select few they receive an invitation to be a part of the Alpha program as well.

Only about 55 students were selected out of the class of '11, about 105 students from the '12 class, and about 85 for the class of '13

For Alpha students many difficulties come with the honor of being accepted.

"I was told it was just about science fair but it is a lot more than that. We have more AP classes that are mandatory," said Sarah Hanses, Div. 266, "I also think that high school in general turned out harder than we thought."

"I found it to be a lot more challenging than I originally thought it would be. I didn't expect us to spend so much time on science fair and not only that, but I didn't realize how hard we'd have to work on each part of it," said Fatima Sabanovic, Div. 278, "I didn't expect there to be an experiment, board, and 30 page paper. I didn't think science fair would be taken as seriously as it is.

In addition, students in the program, find it hard to balance the science fair with other classes in the curriculum.

"It is hard when it is science fair time and you have an AP US History folder due. Then you have to stay up all night long and it's not right that you can text people at four in the morning because you know they are up," said Hanses.

"I remember pulling many all nighters during the school year just to get all my work done," said Joanna Buksa, Div. 171, "Basically if you are in Alpha, you are going to be sleep deprived most of your time, especially around deadlines because they come really fast."

The small class sizes that the Alpha Program consists of also prove to be a disadvantage for students due to the cohort component of Alpha. These cohort classes

mean that students of the program go to their english, science, and math classes all together everyday. This set up encourages these students in the same program to work together.

"You don't get to meet many new people because you have the same kids in most of the classes, and you can not really take electives because you have to stick with the alpha classes," said Buksa.

"One of the disadvantages is that you see the same people and you basically only have two different classes," said Hanses, "You know everyone. We are missing out on the high school experience."

On the other hand, students admit the advantages of these rigorous classes as well.

"The advantage of the Alpha program is that we get to work together to solve problems," said Saad Khan, Div. 261, "And also we are learing through experience."

"I like that it looks good for college and I like how close you become with all the other Alpha students," said Sabanovic.

"You learn a lot and become closer with your teachers," said Hanses.

"Doing the science fair looks really good on your transcripts and if you do well on your science fair, you may qualify for many scholarships and money prizes," said Buksa

Although there was an old Alpha program that was around before this new program it had been discontinued in the year of 06/07 because enrollment went down.

The new Alpha program, similar to the old one but different as well, was started three years ago by Dr. Dignam. It is an "intensive honors program focusing on science fair, mathematics, technical reading and writing, engineering, and technology," according to the description Dignam posted on Lane's website.

However, along with students, teachers also acknowledge the demand the program has on students.

'Students are not prepared for this kind of rigorous program in elementary school," said Mr. Lanfair, Alpha

freshmen biology teacher, "They get a lot of expectations at such a high level of education."

"There is more responsibility," said Mr. Kopack. "Besides doing the [science] project, they have to complete the honors curriculum. I would actually call it honors plus.'

"For freshmen, they need to pick their science project and if it is good enough they need to stick with it for the next three years," said Ms. Feuer, the English teacher for sophomore and then freshmen students for the old Alpha program, "Freshmen year is overwhelming enough anyway."

Teachers not only find that there are difficulties for students but there are difficulties for teachers as well.

"It is difficult to coordinate with other staff members in the program," said Mr. Lanfair, "Students get frustrated because they get different expectations from teachers."

For Ms. Feuer the lengthy science papers were the hardest part about the program.

"I am not a science person. I did terribly in my science classes," said Feuer, "I struggled through reading those papers. It was not exciting to read them."

Despite all the difficulties students face, teachers do what they can to make it more manageable.

"I try to break up the [science] project but I still have students who procrastinate until the last minute, making it harder on themselves," said Mr. Lanfair.

In addition to pointing out the difficult aspects of being in Alpha, the staff identifies the advantages for students.

"There is rigor and college prep in this program. It helps to develop their research, analytical thinking, and working independently," said Feuer, "For kids who want to continue in science through college, the excellent advantage is that scholarships are granted to those that continue on in science fair."

"[Students] will gain study skills and preparation for college," said Mr. Lanfair. "They will have more success in high school and learn time management early."

To some teachers, the program does not seem to have disadvantages.

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"I don't know that there are disadvantages to the program," said Ms. Feuer, "I think that overall students need to challenge themselves more."

This difficult program has led some to believe that there are many students who drop out over time. However, the reality is that the drop out rate is very low.

"There is not a senior level of Alpha which looks like the program decreases by that time but is actually doesn't," said Dr. Dignam, "Of course [the program has] students not performing well, same as AP and Honors."

Students acknowledge the fact that they do not have any plans to drop out of the program.

"You hold yourself to a standard and you do not want to be the one who drops out," said Hanses.

"I feel like I've already spent a year doing it, might as well finish what I started," said Sabanovic, "On top of that, freshmen year is the hardest. The first year you create your foundation and the rest, you just build off of it. So I think each year, it'll get a little easier."

Furthermore, the Alpha program is a component that is a unique opportunity to only Lane students.

"Lane is the only school in the area that has an Alpha program," said Dr. Dignam.

However, Lane is working with other suburban schools with similar programs.

"In the suburbs the science program is not called Alpha. They call it the STEM program which stands for Science, Technology, Engineering, and Math," said Kopack.

This collaboration is to help better the programs in these schools, some of which include Niles West and Niles North.

Overall, Dr. Dignam acknowledges that program is hard but the outcome for students is positive in many

"This is a rigorous program but the goal is to make the student feel successful," said Dr. Dignam.

Chemistry students compete to make best 'moles'

Chemistry teachers, Mrs. McCoy and Mr. Reid, agree that the purpose of the mole project is to help students better understand the fundamental term of 'the mole' in chemistry.

"A mole is a unit used to measure an atom. But the atom is so small, we use scientific notation 6.022×1023 . The term is such an astronomic number that it's hard to understand. It would take forever to count to that number so the idea is fathom to anyone's mind," Mr. Reid said.

Although the purpose of making a mole may seem only academic, teachers hope that students can also have fun creating a mole with their families while learning chemistry.

'Boobies' get support Underwater robot contest could lead to Hawaii trip

As the weather outside remains cold, John Green's physics class imagines how hot Hawaii might be. Hawaii is where this year's nationals will be held for an underwater robot building con-

This past winter break, Green, a new teacher in the physics department, met with the education director of the Shedd Aquarium. He applied for a grant from the Lane Tech Alumni Foundation, which he hopes will help pay for the building of a robot.

On May 1, the University of Illinois at Chicago will be hosting the first round of the contest. They will use their swimming pool to put the competing robots to the test.

The room will be filled with eight teams, which will be in groups of 10-15 students. Each team must build a multifunctional underwater ROV(remote operated vehicle) to compete with other teams in the mid-west region. The robot must be able to complete four tasks.

To perform these tasks they recreate a scientific expedition. Task one consists of unloading sensory equipment underwater and plugging in the sensory equipment. Here they will use their robot to pull out and plug in metal rods.(100 points).Task two, they will collect samples of a new species of crustacean; which are little crabs and shrimp. (60 points). Task three involves monitoring the temperature of an undersea vent, this vent releases a different temperature then the water surrounding it.(80 points). Task fours objective is to collect a sample of a bacterial mat, which is similar to gel (60 points).

Lane will compete with other schools in Illinois, Boy Scout Troops from the state of Michigan, and other middle and high schools in both states.

As far as competition, Green can not say, for sure, how well the others might Students competing in the contest meet in Room 225

do because it is Lanes first year competing.

Mr. Green could not explain in words how excited he is, but admits it will not be easy even with the help from other teachers.

He has put together a group of students who are interested in the challenge. Although they are not necessarily familiar with building a robot, Green has full confidence in them.

"If our students apply themselves, they can win the regional for sure," he says.

The team who collects the most points in total, which is a combination of all categories, places first and wins regionals. First prize receives a trophy, a \$500 Visa card, \$2,000 in travel support to attend UI 2008, and Lights Camera Action which is an underwater camera.

First prize winners will move on to nationals. This year nationals are being held June 24 - 26, 2010 at the University of Hawaii at Hilo.

After "pulling a few strings," Green said that if Lane students win, they may only have to pay two-thirds of the ticket for a round trip to Hawaii, estimating close to \$400.

In Hawaii, competition will only get harder. Here they will go against teams nation wide, teams who dominated those in their region once before.

Although few students have a robot building background, Green was not shy in admitting to owning a few himself.

"I have a fully-functional jellyfish robot and a Toby Tomi 2000," said Green.

Students will work to create this underwater machine from now, up until the day of competition. This means a full four months of thought and precise creativity. After weeks of training and building, students will be given one chance. Within 15 minutes, their robots must complete all four tasks without stopping. Each task is equally difficult according to Green.

Prizes consist of money ranging between \$50-500, and are given to winners of different categories: best engineering design, those who exhibit most safety, best poster etc. They also reward the team who spent the least to build their robot with a monetary prize as well.

Although Mr. Green expressed his enthusiasm, the project will be the work of his students.

"The students do all the work. I'm just there to help get the students what they need to participate. Getting the money, making phone calls, purchasing, etc... said Green

"I could be an art dealer," said Larsen, who plans on going to art school next year.


"I am planning on doing this as a hobby," said Aldama. "I want to go into computer design."

However, Ms. Paganelli, an Italian teacher and an Italian-American from the east coast, finds the show offensive. It was mostly a family oriented place because of the boardwalk, but that has now changed from what people see on the show.

"I am offended by it because it appears to be that it is meant to give a general representation of Italian-Americans, and it is much farther from the truth," she said. "I am from there and it because I saw that girl get hit in the previews. I love The Real World and it looked like it was going to be almost the same," said Olivia O'Donovan, Div. 150.

"As messed up as the clip was, that is the kind of stuff people are attracted to on TV and that is what they like to watch for some reason," said Koval. Controversy aside, the guido stereotype exists in Chicago as well as the east coast, but that does not mean that they are clones from the show.

"My cousin is definitely a guido, but that does not mean he is trashy and a womanizer [like on the show]," said Pacione. "Eight people do not represent more than a million."

From chicken to boots, students can get it for free

It's fourth period lunch and Monica Garcia, Div. 266, is about to steal a packet of gum at Jewel. She walks over to the gum rack and chooses her favorite gum, Polar Ice. She takes it, feeling the plastic, focusing on finding the ridge in between plastic that will allow her to rip it off easily.

She heads over to the gift card section and picks up a random \$20 eBay card. She feigns interest. Her other hand has already snuck the gum packet under the gift card. Her hands and the card shield the gum. No one notices that the plastic has been torn off. Monica looks over her shoulder and, reassured that no one is watching, she pockets the gum sticks.

Discount

Getting rid of the box and bar code, she assumes no alarm will ring as she exits the building.

According to www. shopliftingprevention.org, one in every 11 people shoplifts. Teens are responsible for 25% of all shoplifting.

D'Arcy Lyness, Ph.D., Behavioral Health Editor for kidshealth. org and Child and Adolescent Psychologist, classifies shoplifting into two categories.

First there are the amateur or casual shoplifters. Casual shoplifters tend not to have intentions of stealing; they just seize available shoplifting opportunities.

Then there are the pros. They usually take more expensive items, like clothing and jewelry.

The small timers

Shoplifting is common enough at Lane that in 2008 an economics class designed a tee shirt with a list titled, "You know you go to Lane when..." and one of the 10 sayings was "You are warned to not steal chicken from Jewel."

"Everything tastes better stolen," said Jonathan McGee, Div. 034, who was a shoplifter his freshmen year.

He would walk into Jewel on a regular basis and walk out with a full stomach and no receipt.

One day during his freshman year, he walked in, grabbed a sausage pizza, a grape Fanta, and a pack of gum. As he walked through the aisles he would leave his wrappers behind. He was heading out after leaving his unfinished pop on a shelf when a man approached him and took him to a back room.

McGee was presented with the evidence: the pizza box, the gum packet missing one piece of gum, and the opened pop. McGee had to pay for the merchandise, they called his mother, and for the remainder of the year Mc-Gee feared walking into Jewel.

"My mom made me pay, and then

"I had bad influences, but I've stopped," Garcia said.

Garcia's specialty was stealing gum, and she found it easy to get away with stealing it.

The Pros

A Lane student, who we will only be referred to as Mercado, started off as a petty thief.

"I've been shoplifting since the beginning of times," Mercado said. "It was after sophomore year that it became a habit. Now I steal anything I can get my hands on."

Mercado believes it is her innocent looks that have aided her in keeping a "never been caught" record.

Jessica O., who chose not to disclose her division number, began her shoplifting career about a year ago. All her

friends were doing it so she shoplifted as well. Now she steals "everything from make-up to clothes to food."

One of the most impressive things she has managed to steal is a pair of boots. She ripped off the tags, stuffed the boots in her bag, and walked out of Target.

"When I steal something I feel like I accomplished something big," O said. "I've been lucky enough to not have been caught."

For these two "pro" shoplifters it is crucial to find the right environment. Both prefer stores like Hollister where stealing is easy.

"It's easy [to shoplift]. Hollister is perfect because it's dark and the workers are into their own conversations," Mercado said.

Disorder or bad habits?

There is a real disorder called kleptomania, which is the compulsive urge to steal, regardless of value or importance. However, according to www.bipolarcenter.com less than 5% of all reported shoplifting is actually committed by kleptomaniacs.

Students have various motivations to shoplift: peer pressure, lack of money, the thrill and rush of getting away with it, and even the attention they may receive.

"I had bad influences. My friends were doing it so I did it too," Garcia said.

Garcia no longer steals, but she was fortunate enough never

to get caught when she did. Not pall shoplifters have the same luck.

The consequences of getting caught shoplifting are predictable: One must pay for the merchandise, and might earn a criminal record.

The bigger picture is that shoplifting increases the price of merchandise. Stores realize that shoplifting will occur and raise prices in order to make up for lost profits.

According to www.onlinelawyersource.com, the average family in America spends 300 every year in order to make up for the

cost of what shoplifters steal.


At Lane, stealing students have been drawn to shoplifting due to the thrill, peer pressure, or even because of the financial aspect of the situation.

Others choose not to steal because it makes them feel guilty.

Heena Jaffri, Div. 178, stole a Tootsie roll at the age of five because her brother would not buy it for her. She was never able to eat her tootsie roll. Her conscience got in the way.

"I felt bad, it's not right to steal," Jaffri said. "Plus it's a commandment: 'Thou shall not steal'."

Infidelity brings relationships to an end

Cheating hurts and it's one thing many don't want to experience. "She said we gotta talk. 'You know that bar in Tel Aviv with the big red cones?' I instantly knew what she was gonna say. My heart sank and felt like a knife went through it. She said she was drunk, but please. That is never an excuse to cheat. [I think] she wanted an easy out," said Nicholas Bruscato, Div. 021, explaining how he found out the first time he was cheated on. Ange Angarita, Div. 036, hid inside a Starbucks coffee shop for an hour and a half for her boyfriend, Hiathem Hamdan, Div. 168 to arrive. However, he was not late. Hamdan was said Paulina W., Div. returning her coat and purse she had left in his house while sneaking out the door, so his mom would not catch them together. He had to quietly leave the house later on, so his mom would not be suspicious. This type of sneaky behavior is common among teens involved in forbidden relationships.

For Kamile Sutaite, Div. 156, not seeing her father for a few days at a time is completely normal. Since he is a construction worker, he often has to fulfill jobs in other states. Like Kamile, many Lane students must endure parental absence in order for their parents to support their families.

According to J. Heymann, author of The Widening Gap: Why America's Working Families are in Jeopardy and What Can Be Done About It, non-standard work schedules can be so physically exhausting that they hinder parents' abilities to nurture their children's development. Mrs. Andros, a Lane counselor, agrees with this assessment.

"When kids don't have parental support at home, it affects their work," said Andros. "They think they can get away with more things. Their grades could drop because they feel that their parents don't support them emotionally and academically. They could start feeling lonely and depressed and it could show

in their work and demeanor." In some students' households, Hey-

mann's observation is apparent. "Some people have parents who each day [say], 'Do your homework.' My parents don't do that and they leave me to be more independent about my work. I sometimes don't do my work completely. [When I lived in Lithuania, my mom worked a whole month in Russia and [I would only see her three days per month],"said Sutaite. "I didn't have a female role model at all. [That's why] I guess I don't really know how to act around girls. I have better friendships with guys."

"My dad prints designs. He works pretty much the whole week ... about ten hours per day. I leave [for school] before he gets home and by the time I come back, he's already left for work," said Luis Villalobos, Div. 021. "It doesn't really matter if he's there or not because either way, I don't really interact with him [since he sleeps when he is home]."

"As a little kid, [my parents] worked less. Before, we used to have nice dinners and my mom cooked everyday.

Now, she's really tired [when she comes home from work] and she'll eat a little, watch TV, and fall asleep," said Jessica Roman, Div. 034.

Due to the absence of parents, extra responsibilities often fall onto the shoulders of students.



"I have to take care of [my younger brother] more. I have to give him dinner, help him with his homework, and make him go to bed," said Kasia Doroz, Div. 365.

"I have to babysit my little siblings till [my mom] comes home. I don't get to go out with my friends or get to focus on my homework as much," said Cassandra Perez, Div. 163.

Once accustomed to their parents'

schedules, some students were able to accept that they could not always be with their parents.

"I don't see [my parents' long work schedules] as a bad thing. For me, it's something that's necessary or we're not gonna eat tonight," said Roman.

However, others still desire more quality time with their parents.

"If he wasn't working so hard, I would like [to spend time with my dad] cause my dad's fun and he cracks a lot of jokes," said Villalobos.

Like those who wish for more time with their parents, parents themselves often regret that they have lost memories and time with their children.

"Yes, I've been disappointed to miss a nursery school play, a choir concert here and there," said Ms. Thompson, English teacher. "[However], one of the things that help [my] children to grow is for them to have independence and have room to stretch on their own."

Despite the difficulties that work schedules present to families, many students attempt to keep their family together and aware of each other's lives.

"Me and my mom try to keep it [a relationship] up. Sundays are our family day. [We] stay at home and talk or we go somewhere together," said Roman.

"[We] make it up over the weekend. We cook together, go shopping, or go out and eat as a family," said Doroz.

Mr. Cox, Lane's social worker, states that from the students he has seen at Lane, he thinks that parents' work schedules are not as harmful as they seem. It can even positively affect adolescents.

"Those kids are forced to take on parental responsibilities and become more independent," said Cox. [From what I've seen], they've really stepped up, and it doesn't hinder them. For the most part, for kids at Lane, I really don't believe it's a deterrent."

According to Sutaite, watching her parents work has taught her a valuable lesson. If she does not receive an education, she, like her parents, will have to get a job that requires a long work schedule and affects family life.

Teachers utilize games in lesson plans to help students succeed

At Lane, many teachers have come up with unique ways to help students review for upcoming tests and quizzes. Some play educational games such as "jeopardy" or "battle of the sexes."

Creating a lively classroom environment is essential for every teacher. Many students tend to get distracted easily in class, especially before an upcoming quiz or test. Mrs. Reedy, a history teacher, is one of many teachers at Lane who has created her own game to aid students. She plays a review game with her freshmen. However, it is not a typical review game because every student must be prepared to answer a question at any given moment.

"It's a review that everyone has to answer, so no one can space out," said Reedy

However, there are other teachers that play games that are not always just focused on benefiting the students' test and quiz scores. Some games are played to broaden students' knowledge about the world.

Mr. Bertenshaw, an English teacher, plays a trivia game with his students on a daily basis.

Mr. Markese, a math teacher, also plays a review based on Jeopardy. His version is titled, "Math Jeopardy."

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Biracial students struggle to fight stereotypes of identity

Black, white, brown, and yellow; they are not just colors, but what some people see when they look at others.

Many students place racial labels on their peers after only looking at their physical appearance. For biracial students, this way of thinking is often

offensive. Sarah Clark, Div. 020, is of Caucasian and Mexican descent. Her mother is Mexican and her

father is Caucasian, but she looks Caucasian. "No one believes [that I'm Mexican] because of my fair skin," said Clark. "When people see my

mom, they think that I was adopted. It is upsetting because there is no way to prove it." Clark is not the only one that, when seen, is

Haecker aspires to eventually play in the

World Series of Poker Europe, a tournament in which poker players around the world compete and in which the finalist play for millions of dollars

"I want to play in the World Series of Poker Europe because I can play when I turn 18," Said Haecker.

The prize money for the annual World Series Of Poker, hosted in Las Vegas, reached a new high in 2006 when Jamie Gold, the first place winner in the tournament, won \$12 million.

Successful poker professionals can be young, including Joseph Cada, the 21 year old first place winner of the World Series of Poker in 2009 who won \$8.5 million. Cada, much like students at Lane, started his career playing online poker.

Online poker playing has its ups and downs and can become costly to its players when they are not careful.

"I had \$20, turned it into \$180, then lost it all within five minutes," said Turner. "It was a one on one game, I had a full house and he just happened to have a full house that was better than mine," he continued.

Haecker too has lost money while playing online. Haecker, within a week lost a total of \$300. Despite these losses, Haecker learns from both his poker successes and his mistakes

When a player wants to collect his winnings a check is sent through the mail from the poker company.

However, due to legal issues with online gambling websites, banks in the United States refuse to cash checks sent from online poker websites. To get around this, online gambling sites send checks to the player

through other companies allowing the player to deposit the check in the bank.

"One check came from a flower shop website, and one came from a beauty shop website," said Turner.

Turner plays in the Main Event Charity Games, a weekly local poker tournament in which money from the initial buy-in goes towards charity. The first place prize of the tournament is several thousand dollars.

With countless websites dealing with poker strategies, a successful poker player has to have an understanding of card odds, statistics, and a knowledge of how to play a hand

"I play poker online and I hate it when people say it's a game of luck," said Tim Botsford, Div. 049.

In order to become a better poker player, Haecker and Turner play multiple games at a time.

"I play five hours at a time and about eight tables [at once]," Haecker said.

While some players enjoy the thrills of

gambling and even become addicted, Turner enjoys poker as it is a way of earning extra money outside from his typical job.

"It's much more fun to earn money playing a game than at a job," said Turner.

Haecker and Turner are friends and play poker together when possible.

"We play cards at lunch close to everyday and online [occasionally]," said Turner.

Although both Haecker and Turner are responsible while playing poker and do not gamble excessively, when not responsible gambling can become a serious and costly addiction. According to the Minnesota Department of Human Services roughly two million individuals are pathological gamblers. In 76 percent of those pathological gamblers a major depressive disorder is likely to occur.

"I'm reasonable with poker, I don't spend money that I don't have," Haecker said.

Band Room attic, treasure vault of history

The door opens with a rush of dusty air. Worn out stairs, lined with chipped paint and dirt, lead up to the band room attic. What used to house the radio club in the 1940s is now just another forgotten part of Lane history.

At the top of the stairs stand two windows, one cracked down the middle, letting in the only light in the room. Old issues of the Lane Daily dating back to the early 1930s, handwritten sheet music, old marching uniforms, and even geometry homework left behind by a student from 1949 rest in boxes on the floor. To the left, books sit on shelves barely able to hold their weight. Signatures, tributes, and dates cover the brown walls and ceiling as a testimony to past generations of band students.

Although it is not a widely known spot in Lane (even to many band students), those who have been to the attic have witnessed and appreciated the room's history.

"There was a bunch of cool stuff, old books, old parts of instruments, and writing on the walls from previous classes from like 20, 30, 40 years ago," said Liam Hoy, Div. 261, who was allowed to enter the attic one day last year.

Dozens of names are etched into and written on the walls. The earliest is from 1953. There are a few names from the 60s and an explosion of signatures from the 70s, 80s, and 90s.

'You see on the walls people from other classes and it makes you think about all the history of the school you don't normally think about," said Lia Parrillo, Div. 177

In a corner, a small tribute to Jim Morrison, front man for the Doors whose sudden death due to heart failure left fans heartbroken, stands out among the graffiti. It reads, "This Is The End, Jim Morrison 1943-1971." It is a reference to "The End," a hit song released by the Doors in 1967. Below that, a reference to Jimi Hendrix is also made. It says "Are you experienced?-Jimi Hendrix," based off of a song also released in 1967 by Hendrix.

In several different spots on the wall, a group of tuba players left a reminder that "Tubas rule!" A few students revisited the wall several times, with nicknames such as Slugger and Findlay.

"I think that it's amazing people wrote little things like nicknames. We want to be in on their inside jokes," said Amy Piekosz, Div. 183.

A pre-band festival good luck telegram was found in one of the many boxes, dated March 28, 1974. It says, "Good luck and give 'em hell at the band festival. A highly superior rating for a highly superior band and director. Mazel Tov. Best wishes, the guy who waves the stick in front of the orchestra."

Old issues of the Lane Daily tell of World War II memorials (including the dedication of the "Shooting the Stars" statue that resides in the Memorial Garden), ROTC Hops, Dancing in Gym 1, Swing Shows, and Clean Up Drives. The earliest issues of the Lane Daily found in the attic are from around the early 1930s.

There are many hand written papers, rosters going back to the late 1920s, little notes between directors, and even hand written music.

"The coolest thing was original manuscripts of some of the most famous pieces, some dating back as far as 1920," said Anthony De-Francisco, Div. 270.

Although the earliest original manuscripts of pieces are from the 1920s, there is a handwritten orchestral arrangement of Romeo et Juliette, a popular opera in the 1800s, found mixed in with papers labeled "New York, 3 Agosto, 1889."

'We found some concert programs from, I would say, the mid-30s.

The coolest thing for me is the programs, to see the instrumentation, what kind of songs, and what level. But I do like the signatures too," said Mr. O'Brien, Band director.

Before it was the attic, it housed the Lane Radio Club in the 1940s, which was sponsored by a teacher named F. Kulieke. In fact. in 1922, George Frost, senior and president of the radio club, installed the first car radio into a Ford Model-T.

Due to radio restrictions passed in 1934, students could no longer broadcast on the radio. The legacy of it remains in the band room attic.

At Lane, Cook and Williams are part of the Hearing Impaired Program. There are 12 students in this program, and three of them require interpreters

Ms. Seifert is the interpreter that works with Williams and Cook.

"One of the best parts of my job is just spending time with the students, and being exposed to all of their classes. It's like I'm learning things all over again," said Ms. Seifert. She became an interpreter because her aunt had the same profession.

The other interpreter, Ms. Flie, goes with Arrleta to her classes.

"I became an interpreter because my sister is deaf," she said. Ms. Flie also revealed that next year, Lane will start a Sign Language Club.

Williams and Cook have known each other for five years, and have all their classes together at Lane.

"They fit right in," said Dr. Dossing, their Biology teacher. Dossing stated that while she sometimes gives Williams and Cook alternative assignments, they usually do the same work as everyone else

"We mostly talk to each other," said Williams. "But all the other students in our classes are really nice to us. We have no problems with anyone. However, Williams and Cook said that at Bell, they had numerous problems with the other students. "Some of the kids that weren't hard of hearing would take advantage of us," said Cook. "They would make other deaf kids teach them bad words in sign language, and then they would make these signs to us. I don't know why. We never did anything to them." Cook also described how, at Bell, he would play football with other kids and some of them would be mean to him. They knew that he could not hear everything they were saying so they would use that to their advantage when play[Lane]."

Ms. Flie worked at Bell for 16 years before she came to Lane. She said that a lot of the hearing students are not used to being around deaf students, which often causes some of them to treat them differently. However, she never saw any mistreatment.

Williams and Cook both said that being hard of hearing does not bother them.

"I can still hear," said Williams. "Even though it's not very strong, I can also talk.

Cook finds it funny when people call his name and do not know that he cannot hear them.

"I only notice them if they shout really loud or if they are close to me," said

Cook.

Williams and Cook are already looking forward to the future. She wants to be a doctor and he wants to be a video game designer or hockey player.

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"I love hockey. My favorite team is the Black Hawks and my favorite player is Cristobal Huet. He's awesome," said Cook, while sporting a Huet jersey. He said that his lack of hearing is not an obstacle when playing hockey.

Being hard of hearing may force Williams and Cook to have an interpreter, but it does not stop them from doing things that they enjoy. In the end, they ultimately decide what they want to do, and nothing can stop them from pursuing their dreams in life.

do not always have a choice as to whether or not they are employed.



A shining gold star lies above you in a tree. How can you reach it? Could you summon a ladder, or ride on the back of an elephant? Imagine yourself in a world where you could summon anything you can think of and watch it come to life.

Published by Warner Bros. and created by 5th Cell, the newly developed Nintendo DS game, "Scribblenauts," challenges players with over 200 levels in which they must use their reasoning skills to grab the strategically placed "starite" by summoning any thing that they can imagine.

As the character Maxwell, the player must use the keyboard on the touch screen to type in any noun that they think will help them solve the puzzle. Although only 10 items can be summoned in each level, they appear and function on the screen as a kid-like sketch version of the object. For example, if the player brings God onto the screen and decides to give him a skateboard, He will ride around on


Another genius aspect of this game is that all things function as they do in nature. For example, fire will burn any flammable material, and water will put the fire out. If the player summons a carnivore such as a lion, it will attack and eat the player's character and/or any

smaller animal a lion could consume. The player may also summon vehicles such as helicopters, fire trucks, and airplanes- the possibilities are

endless!

The more creative the player is in summoning objects in each level, the more points the player receives. After finishing a level by obtaining the starite, the player may go back and win it again using different things to earn more points. There are special awards - no weapons, botanist, gold digger, and marine biologist - achieved based on the types of objects the player brings to the level. I found myself motivated to replay levels I had already won, which is a unique quality of this particular game that I have not found in most others I have played.

My only criticisms of the game include



the few restrictions on the nouns the player can summon. I think it would be neat to bring Elvis or Britney Spears into the game, but this is unfortunately not an option. Additionally, the player controls Maxwell using the stylus on the touch screen, and the controls are sometimes a little off. This is rare, however, and is usually only a problem if the player has given Maxwell wings to fly around, as he does not stay airborne for long.

Scribblenauts will keep the player entertained for hours and is surprisingly challenging. Despite the fact that almost anything can be used to win the starite in each level, 5th Cell has done an excellent job placing very difficult obstacles in its way. I can promise that this game is intriguing, magical, and simply fantastic. If players somehow find a level boring (which is nearly impossible), they can simply type "time machine" onto the screen and travel to

Gamers answer **Call of Duty**

The most anticipated video game of 2009 had gamers flooding into any and every game store in the country back in November.

Call of Duty: Modern Warfare 2, rated M, is a direct sequel to Call of Duty 4 and was developed by Infinity Ward, published by Activision. It is available on Xbox 360, Play Station 3, and Microsoft Windows.

Modern Warfare 2 is a first-person war shooter played in either single player or multiplayer modes. Single player campaign mode can be played in different difficulties depending on the player's skill and confidence.

Campaign mode restarts where Call of Duty 4 ended. You are an Army Ranger put to the task of protecting the country from a Russian invasion and their "ultranationalists." Adventures include racing down a mountain on a snowmobile, various man hunts, and a controversial mission where you are forced to go under cover and work for the enemy. I recommend the campaign mode to be played with an HD TV and a surround sound system. The graphics are well-thought out, especially if you notice the minute details, such as a dirt spot on a soldier's face or the occasional graffiti art seen throughout the game. The camera angles that are used in each scene made me feel as I was the actual soldier in the game. The only downside to the mode is that it can easily be completed in 7 total hours, which is relatively short compared to other first person shooters. Because campaign is relatively short, when they conquer it gamers can play online multiplayer mode. This is where Infinity Ward really worked to improve and expand and is what

caught my eye. With over 10 different games to be played during online multiplayer, which also has the largest online community, there is something for everybody.

Being a sequel there are bound to be comparisons with the original Modern Warfare. To avoid this Infinity Ward has added many new weapons and features. Some of the main additions are the new kill streaks, titles, and emblems.

The titles and emblems are unlocked by completing certain tasks and challenges that can be displayed to other players to show what each player has done, such as sprinting for a certain amount of miles or reaching a certain level. This combined with the deep ranking system keeps players interested in playing and makes online multiplayer virtually never ending. Of course with any video game there will be players that are frowned upon due to their choice of playing style. 'Campers' and 'boosters' are the root of all evil in the Call of Duty world. Camping is when a player stays hidden in one spot and waits for an enemy to run by. This gives them an automatic advantage. Boosting is when two players from opposing teams help each other achieve challenges, which moves players up to higher ranks faster. Although there was an update to remove some of the glitches, there is no way to get rid of these styles of play.

Left 4 Dead 2 (L4D2), the sequel videogame to the original Left 4 Dead (L4D), is the ultimate zombie game. Instead of releasing a massive online update to the original, Valve (the makers of L4D) released the second game. Many were skeptical of the quick release (practically a year after the first one came out), but it is definitely not a disappointment.

Four new survivors are introduced in the new location of the Deep South: Coach, Rochelle, Ellis and Nick. These four characters have to go through five new, awesomely dreadful environments in the campaign mode until finally rescued. From fighting zombies on rollercoaster tracks in 'Dead Carnival', to treading water and getting mud slapped in their face in 'Swamp Fever', the survivors face intense and chaotic combat in all environments. For some extra spice, weather conditions include torrential rains and strong winds, which negatively alter visibility. Brand-new weapons can be picked up in all these settings.

Besides the original health packs, defibrillators and adrenaline shots have been included for the survivors' benefit. Use the defibrillator to pump a friend back to life, or take an adrenaline shot for life-saving speed. However, like the original pain pills, adrenaline shots only give temporary health.

Sure, all of that is great, but that doesn't make the 'warfare' any easier.

The Special Infected (zombies that have been mutated into stronger beasts) have three new additions to their original team of four. The Charger runs toward survivors and pummels them to death. The Jockey lunges onto the heads of unsuspecting survivors and steers them away from their team. The Spitter's Spit is highly toxic and causes major damage to survivors.

All of the Special Infected are playable in Versus, an online game mode from the original game, which allows a group of four to play as infected and four as survivors. Whoever racks up the most points at the end of a campaign wins.

Yet another sweet addition is Scavenge, a new game mode. With the fun of Versus, this time-based challenge has the Survivor team searching for fuel to fill a generator as the Infected do everything to try and stop them. It's fast-paced, suspenseful, and an emotion inducer (usually anger). The sequel delivers the best zombie-slaughtering experience possible. The graphics are state-of-theart (if realistically bloody is an art form). The sounds include freaky zombie groans, screams, maniacal laughs and cries. There are also some humorous comments from the survivors, over eerie southern music (out-of-tune banjoes, fiddles and accordions). With all this new stuff, L4D2 is constantly entertaining. I have yet to leave this game without my palms feeling sweaty and my heart racing, raving to my friends and fellow players. Screaming into my microphone for help (or just for the hell of it) is a regular part of the game for me. The Turquoise Cafe is located on Roscoe and Leavitt, which is around a 10-15 minute walk from Lane. This is a well suited name for this restaurant, since the color turquoise reminds me of the ocean, which fits well for the restaurant since it offers a variety of very appetizing Mediterranean food. I heard about this restaurant when I first ate there on a field trip for my French class. They served us a community style lunch and everything was delicious. I had never heard of or tried most of the food on the menu because I usually do not eat outside of Hispanic food. This was one of the reasons why I was very hesitant about trying these new foods. However, my friends convinced me to get out of my comfort zone and try new things, so I did. It is definitely a choice that I do not regret.

When I revisited Turquoise Cafe with a friend it was six o' clock, so we had to order from the dinner menus, which at first glance can be pretty intimidating. Since we were on a tight budget, my friend and I decided to share a plate. We ordered "Adana Kabob" and an order of fries. While we waited for our dinner we were served a homemade triangular bread that was embedded with seeds.

Although the bread had a hard exterior, it was really soft and chewy on the inside.

We were also served a plate of yellowish/orange spread that was a substance composed of carrot, yogurt, olive oil, garlic, salt, and pepper. We used this as a spread over our bread, which gave it a sour but

creamy flavor. The fries that we ordered were very appetizing. They are probably some of the best fries that I have ever tasted -yes, even better than McDonald's fries. They did not overwhelm my mouth with salt -instead, they were thin and seasoned, which gave the fries a very unique, satisfying taste that was centered around the seasoning in the potato.

The Adana Kabob we ordered consists of chopped seasoned lamb shoulder with red peppers, crushed pepper, and grilled vegetables. I had never tried lamb before, and when I did it tasted very gratifying. The meat was well done and not over cooked. I liked that the lamb was dry instead of covered with grease, like most meats are. This allowed me to taste the spices that were stuffed into the meat, which added to its enticing flavor. This was all served on top of rice pilaf and served with yogurt sauce. The rice was plain and moist, but the white yogurt sauce added a sour yet sweet taste.

The desserts that we ordered were Kazandibi and Almond Parfait. The Almond Parfait was a sweet vanilla ice cream, infused with almonds and covered with a chocolate Bacardi sauce. The sauce added a bitter taste to the dessert that was a little strong at first, but was balanced with the sweetness of the ice cream. The Kazadibi was a custard filled with caramelized butter and sugar and topped with vanilla ice cream.

This dessert was soft, creamy, and sugary. Besides the food, I also really enjoyed the restaurant's atmosphere. It was very peaceful, serene, and very family like. When I called to make a reservation, I was greeted on the phone by a very friendly person. When my friend and I got to the restaurant, we were greeted by a friendly hostess who brought us to a table that was covered with a white lined cloth and a white candle in the center. The lighting in the restaurant was dim, and the music that played was very tranquil, quiet, and soothing because of the various soft repeating melodies.

Unfortunately, I had an allergic reaction at the restaurant. I am allergic to eggs and when I ordered dessert, I forgot to ask whether or not the desserts contained eggs. I learned my lesson; when you try new food and you have an allergy, make sure to ask for the ingredients in the food before you order. Overall, our experience at Turquoise Cafe was a good one. We enjoyed our dinner, the music was nice, the waiters were friendly, and there were no rude people shouting across tables as opposed to my usual restaurant options. Our grand total for

Absolutely True Diary tells story of part-time Indian

With witty and quick writing, a strong message, and explicit language that references sexuality and violence, Sherman Alexie author of The Absolutely True Diary of a Part-Time Indian (True Diary) captivates her reader from the start and does not disappoint.

True Diary is the story of a 14 yearold Native American/Indian boy called Junior who, when he enrolls in an all white school outside his reservation, struggles to rise above the stereotypes society associates with his people.

While True Diary attempts to break down society's stereotypes of Indians, it also explores the trials of growing up.

Junior, the main character, is born with "water on the brain" meaning he had too much cerebral spinal fluid in the brain. It leads to his having various body deformities: 42 teeth (check your mout you probably only have thirty-two unless you're deformed as well), nearsighted in one eye, farsighted in the other, skinny, and huge feet and hands (in third grade, Junior's feet were a size 11). Because of his differences, Junior is bullied by other Indians. (In chapter four, three 30 year-old Indian men beat him up). But Junior is not only different physically but also academically. He is too smart, and has a strong desire to learn. When he realizes that the reservation school has been using the same books for over 30 years, he throws the book at the teacher.

his thoughts, fears, and frustrations. It is through his comics that he shows the world that that he sees, adding a smile to the reader.

Junior struggles throughout the book. While learning to adapt to a different culture and chasing a different life, he loses his best friend. He suffers additional torment when within a span of a few months several people he is close to die. All this

Though Lane's mascot is an Indian, I realized I'd never stopped and thought too much about Indians. If I had, I doubt that the image that would have popped into my head would have been anything like Junior.

Lane Japanese, or the Lane Mexicans, or the Lane Africans? Because that would be considered by most to be insensitive, if not blatantly racist. Yet, we have no problem calling ourselves Indians. We seem to have forgotten that the same sensitivity we should show toward different ethnicities should apply to all cultures equally.

We have ignored social duty in regards to Indians. We have forgotten that their minority is also sensitive.

Alexie's True Diary is heart breaking. It exposes the reader to life outside "the rez." It makes the reader face truths of life, whether they are about being a teen in a new school or admitting that as a society - or even a school - we have forgotten our manners.

It is that same teacher who urges Junior to leave the reservation. He explains to Junior that he has a light that everyone else on the reservation has lost and that in order for that light to remain, he must leave.

Following the teachers' advice, Junior goes to Rearden, a school with an Indian mascot, (just like Lane). Rearden is a predominantly White school and there Junior has to learn new rules about the way people treat each other and the way they will treat him.

Facing the troubles of life outside the reservation and troubles at home, Junior turns to art to express

leads him to conclude that he is living in a world where he doesn't belong.

Junior stands as a representation that goes beyond his heritage. He embodies hope to every person that is trying to rise above, and who faces hardships along the way. However, True Diary also has a social message that should speak closely to Lane students.


By declaring the Indian our mascot we open up a door to all sorts of arguments. For example, are we equalizing the

Avatar's visual effects make it top grossing movie of all time

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
Player of the Issue John McCarthy, Div. 356



On Feb. 6 at Regionals, Lane advanced 10 people to Sectionals on Feb. 12-13. Jankowski, Schneider, Finnegan, and Wilson placed first. Hamdan, Michael Murray, and Piotrowiz placed second. Mc-Carthy, Mitch Wilson, and Victor Rivera placed third.

Which CPS high school would be considered the biggest rival of Lane

Depends on who you ask. Athletes from different sports list various schools as their rivals.

Yet, one school currently stands out as a rival to the cheerleading, swimming, and debate teams: Whitney Young.

Recently, Young won city championships in girls cross country, and girls track. Their boys basketball team won the IHSA state tournament last year, led by Marcus Jordan, son of Michael Jordan.

Lane's girls track team finished second to Whitney, while the boys track team won city for the fourth year in a row. Lane's basketball team has not won city in years.

"[Whitney] is the most balanced, talent wise in all events, other than ourselves," said team captain of the Boys' Swim Team, Frank Konrath, Div. 050.

"For a long time it used to be Lane 1st, Young 2nd," said varsity

Two years ago, Lane won city for wrestling. Last year, Kelly won the city title by a slim margin of 20 points.

Lane came back with a vengeance during this season's city championships. They won city by 67.5 points. Kelly finished second.

"There is definitely a different attitude when we go up to wrestle them. None of us like Kelly at all," said varsity wrestler, Jacob Putnam, Div. 032.

When facing rivals, the atmosphere is described as different than when facing another school. Many times, athletes notice a better performance when going up against a rival. Trash talk has been heard and cocky attitude has been exhibited.

"The play tempo is a lot higher. We play with an edge, a desire, a hunger that isn't visible when we play teams like Roosevelt or Mather," said varsity Boy's Soccer player, Aldo Basha, Div. 042.

Basha said Taft and Shurz are the soccer team's biggest rivals. "With Taft and Shurz, we play to win, and win big," said Basha. Konrath had a different explanation. He described the rivalry with Whitney as one familiar to many Chicagoans: Cubs vs. Sox.

"Debaters don't need to trash talk. They mostly make cynical comments behind your back," said Okere.

However, not all teams resort to derogative comments.

"No trash talk between teams. Yes, we all have our opinions about each other, but it does not leave the team," said Varsity cheerleader Ashley Homa, Div. 037.

"We don't really need to talk trash. We show it through our wrestling. We know we're the best wrestling team in the city," said Putnam.

Some coaches know and embrace these rivalries.

"With Shurz, it's as Coach Waz calls it. The Battle of Addison Street," said Basha.

Ruiz said Coach Rummelhoff acknowledges the rivalry with Whitney Young.

"But he usually leaves it to the guys to handle," said Ruiz.

Ruiz said Coach Rummelhoff do not need to publicly acknowledge the rivalry because he knows his swimmers will always strive to beat Young.

Rivalries can be beneficial, and at the same time harmful. They bring out the best in student athletes, but there are times when games or matches get too heated.

In 2007, Young won the city title in swimming. Since then however, Lane is two-time defending city swimming champions.

Varsity cheerleader, Danielle Rangel, Div. 055, also identified Whitney Young as a rival. She said Young has been their rival for the longest time.

Whitney Young is not only a rival to the athletic teams.

Chimene Okere, Div. 025, said Lane's Debate Team historically has frequently beaten Whitney Young.

"But now the tides have turned and their debaters are getting really good," said Okere.

Not all sports teams' rivals are Whitney Young. Recently, Kelly High School has emerged as the biggest opponent to the Varsity Wrestling Team.



You want to win for bragging rights," Konrath said.

"There is definitely trash talk after meets. Young was really cocky after they won City Relays," Ruiz said.

Alexis Morin, Div. 030, named Morgan Park as the Dance Teams rival. She said the rivalry would be classified as hatred, mainly due to a summer camp Lane held over the summer that Morgan Park attended. Morin descried the dancers from Morgan Park as exhibiting a 'we already know that' attitude when Lane dancers complimented them.

"Every competition we go to and [Morgan Park] is there, you can just feel the tension," said Morin. "They think they are so much better than us."

During debate tournaments, participants make remarks, but not in the most common way.

"[Rivalries] make for intense games, heated discussion, and immense speculation...In games you are motivated to play and more motivated to win, not only for your team but also your school," said Basha

"Rivalries are good especially in cheerleading because it's a sport where everything has to be in sync. Rivals keep the squad focused on one goal, and it's to beat [the] rival," said Homa.

Putnam said that he enjoys rivalries, and without them that competition would be bland and not have a meaning.

"I would still compete, but not with as much fierceness," said Putnam. "You always need a rival in competition, no doubt."
